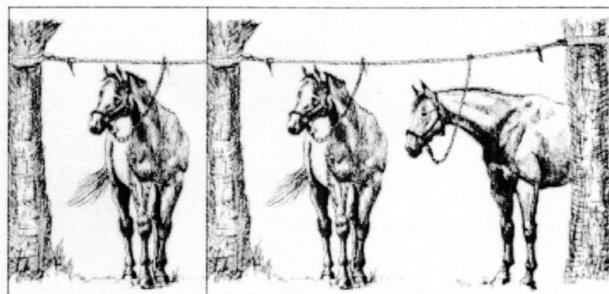

We have some new members in BCH so a short explanation may be in order.

What is a poker ride? Riders ride a designated route at their own speed stopping at designated points to play a game (throw a dart, roll a marble, spin a dial) to determine a playing card. After five stops they have the makings of a poker hand based on how well they did at the games. Winners are the ones with the best and worst poker hands. We expect about 250 riders.

Gift certificates are provided to the best and worst hands. Again this year Corral West Ranchwear is donating two beautiful, large, belt buckles for the two best poker hands. The buckles are on display at the East Sprague Store and will be displayed at the poker ride. There are also many door prizes.

Why does BCH sponsor a poker ride? The poker ride serves several functions. It puts the BCH name out to the riding public and many people learn about what we are doing for the equestrian community. It is a fund raiser for our chapter. In raising money this way we are able to keep our dues to a minimum and it helps to provide many of the services such as printing fliers about BCH and promoting and operating our Leave No Trace program. It is a social event. Although it is a job to put on the event believe me when I say that the people that are involved have lots of fun doing it.

What does it take to put on a poker ride? Mainly lots of volunteers. This is our 14th year and we have it pretty well organized so the stress is minimal but still there is work to get it advertised, organized and run on May 10th.

What should I do? First find out where you can best fit into the picture. This is a multi-talented project so everyone fits in somewhere. In fact, some of our best help comes from our rider's spouses. It is a good opportunity for these people, or other friends, to come out and enjoy being around BCH.

Of course we are still looking for lots more help. On the day of the ride we still need help with outriders, registration, and holding participant's horses during registration. Outriders are members that are positioned along the ride on their horses to watch over the trail. It is a fantastic time to get in a day of riding and help BCH. While people are registering we offer to hold their horses. These volunteers do not bring their own horses. **Please come out and join us in one of the biggest events of the year.**

On May 3rd we have our pre-ride. This is only for the poker ride volunteers as it is a working event and we do not want a large group. The purpose is to check the trail, clear any problems we encounter and to familiarize the volunteers with the route. It also gives those of us that "work" that day an opportunity to see the trail. If you are a volunteer mark your calendar and specifics will be in next month's newsletter.

REMEMBER – tell all your friends about the BCH poker ride, register to ride yourself and volunteer to help. It will be a great day.

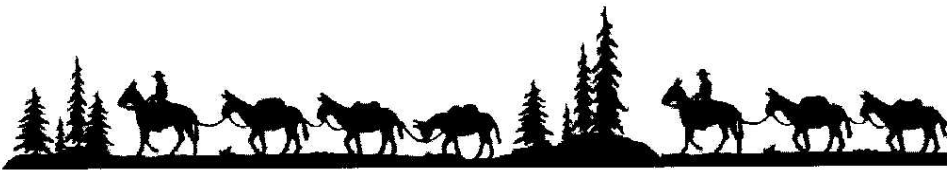

March Membership Meeting Vote

In the February Highline I went into great detail about what is happening in the reorganization of Back Country Horsemen. We also went over it at the January membership meeting. Since then everyone has either received by email or at the February membership meeting a copy of the pertinent bylaws. I will not go through it again here.

What I do want to emphasize is **how important this is to BCH and to this chapter**. A change to 501(c)3 tax status provides great opportunities to BCH. At the same time it is essential that we do it carefully, and that means following the laws as we address the chapter's corporate status.

To this end at the **March membership meeting** we will be taking two significant votes as described in the February Highline.

First, we ask that the members approve a motion to ratify the bylaws of the new IEBCH chapter of Back Country Horsemen of Washington State. This new chapter will have the name of Inland Empire Chapter of Back Country Horsemen of Washington State. **Second**, we ask that the members approve a motion to adopt new bylaws for the old IEBCH chapter changing the name of the corporation to Inland Empire Equestrian Foundation. The effect of these two motions will be to form the new chapter in BCHW and retain the old chapter corporation under a new name. It is noted that the BCHW bylaws, which you received a copy of, have been approved at the state level by the BCHW Board of Directors and do not require a vote of the membership.

This may sound complicated but I assure you everyone will understand what we are doing and why at the March meeting. I encourage you to be there and participate. If you have questions please call me at 466-2225. ★



Riverside State Park Equestrian Area

On March 4th a group of interested equestrians met with Rene' Wiley, Riverside State Parks Manager, and Bill Fraser, Parks Planner, to discuss the future of the equestrian area at the south end of the park. Barbee Scheibner, Sarita Pointek and I attended for BCH.

We reviewed the results of a public questionnaire that had been completed describing potential features for the area. These included such things as an arena, round pens, training area, day use area, parking for the trailhead and overnight equestrian camping.

A rough outline of where the different features could be located was developed. It was determined that this is a very long term project and should be looked at in stages to be developed over the years. Bill Fraser took notes that will be developed into a draft plan. After we have had an opportunity to review it Bill will seek a grant to pay for the planning process.

There is much to be done as we work on the details. The facilities will provide an excellent venue for equestrians and equestrian organizations to conduct events and provide trailhead and camping facilities. It is very important that we have input from all the varying interests. If you know someone that is interested in participating now is the time to become involved. Our next meeting is scheduled for April 14th. ★

Legislative News

Yukon to Yellowstone (Y2Y) State Bill S5318

The bill to establish Washington State's participation in the Yukon to Yellowstone (Y2Y) wildlife corridor passed the senate and failed in the house. The bill was sponsored by a senator from King County and could have affected property rights in upper central and eastern Washington. Unless we want people from large urban centers to tell us how to live, we need to take a few minutes to contact our legislators on issues when alerted. As one senator was recently quoted, "if you are not at the table, you're on the menu"...

Preserving our Equine Heritage on Public Lands (Right to Ride) Federal Bill S2283

The bill has only one sponsor and a co-sponsor (Wyoming). It appears the bill is not being supported this year. This is a good time to contact your national congressmen and express your personal opinion. If you need help, please contact me at alkifarm@gmail.com or call 951-9225.

Certified Wilderness Forage in Washington S6676, HB3073

An agreement has been reached between hay growers and the Washington State Weed Board for certification of wilderness forages in a pilot program. Inspectors will be trained to certify wilderness forage and certify hay fields requesting this service with no fees scheduled. This program will be reviewed next year and adjusted, if necessary. BCHW, the prime mover of these bills, has requested both bills be pulled from the legislative process this year. BCHW Legislative Chair Bob Brooke says "we have a rancher to horsemen hand shake agreement and that is good enough for now" ...

Please remember, your senators and representatives know what you want ONLY if you contact them. They represent you. Stay tuned, stay informed, please take the time to voice your support and help keep our horsemen involved in the legislative process. It's never been more important than now ... ★

Down the Trail

Get Your Horse Ready! Time to catch up your horse, scrape off the winter crud and do some ground work before mounting up. Sources at a local area hospital tell us they are already admitting injured riders who apparently thought they could just mount up and ride off. And, they did for a little ways. We don't want you to spend time in a cast when you could be riding with us.

Trailer Tire Pressure Monitoring

Systems The leading cause of trailering accidents is flat tires which can be mostly prevented by the new tire pressure monitoring systems. They work by installing a pressure sensing valve stem cap with a tiny transmitter on each tire. On the dash is mounted a receiver unit that monitors the transmitters and alerts the driver as tire pressure drops.
