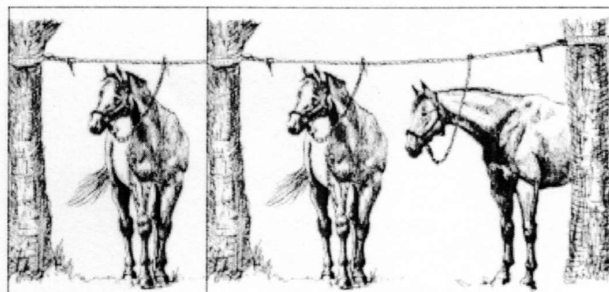

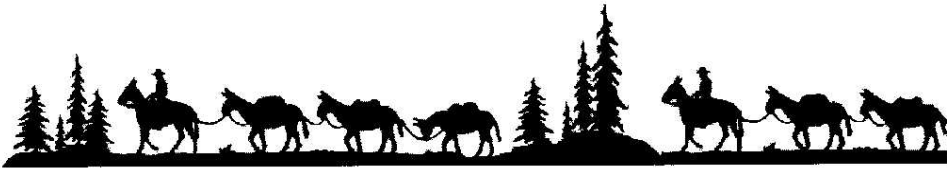

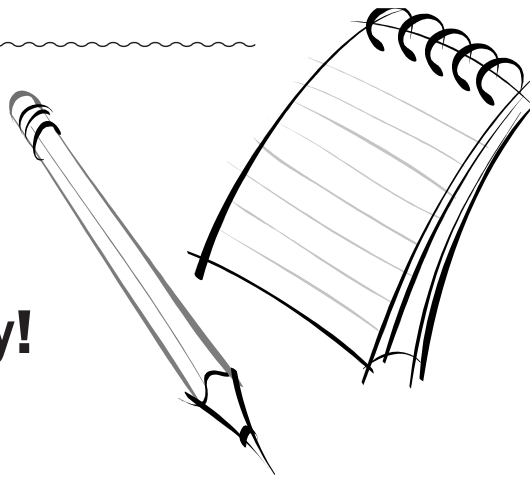

BLM Evaluation of Poker Ride

The Bureau of Land Management (BLM) does a post evaluation of events to determine if the event has met Special Recreation Permit requirements. BLM did such an evaluation on the IEBCH poker ride held last May.

The report states "Permittee performance and compliance excellent....revealed no garbage or other significant impacts left behind. Post use form on time. Insurance was kept current.....All payments made on time and all required materials provided at application."

"Feedback for permittee: All requirements met and obviously very conscientious about practicing Leave No Trace, including riding single file on trails, respecting open and closed gates and respecting conditions at camping and event registration sites. Excellent all-around compliance."

"Per BLM monitoring and communications with permittee, the operating plan conditions and stipulations are clearly being met."

IEBCH received the highest rating possible from BLM. Thank you to all participants and volunteers who made this possible. Hope to see all of you on **May 12, 2012** at our next poker ride. ★

Les Schwab tires have always been the ones to have changed, fixed, and I have always bought tires from them because they treat women so well. I thought the club might be interested in a couple of times I have gotten good information on tire pressure CAPS. I'm a buyer of new items that come out in catalogs. I bought these caps that show green/red on them and put them on the car, truck, and horse trailer. Well I went out one day to pull the trailer and the cap was blown all over the yard and my trailer tire was flat. I asked Les Schwab about it and they said when the sun beats down on the tire and gets hot it expands and blows the cap off and your tire goes flat. SOOOOO I take those off and go get some fancy aluminum caps from Harbor Freight and put them on the truck. I have a flat tire on my horse trailer and decide to check the air in my truck tires. Can't get the cap off no way!!! I pull the trailer into Les Schwab and they fix the trailer tire that had a nail in it and also were able to get those aluminum caps off and check my air in the tires on my pickup. He said if he couldn't get those aluminum caps off I would have to replace the whole valve stem. I now have BLACK plastic caps on all my tires. Thank you Les Schwab. Best thing about this is Les Schwab didn't charge me anything and they gave me a tire gage and said just buy your tires from them. Hope this helps somebody out. ★

Safety Tip

We all like to be kind to our horses but there is one kindness that we should always avoid. That is tying them so long that they can get their head down to the ground to eat grass or hay off the ground.

We continually hear the horror stories about a horse getting entangled in the lead and either injuring him self, injuring someone trying to rescue him or damaging equipment.

There are plenty of opportunities for a horse to eat and they must learn to stand quietly when tied.

For our horse's sake, and for the safety of everyone around us, let's keep our horses tied up short.

Another tip is let's not tie them with the bridle reins as they can get caught up on the bridle. Again, we are asking for trouble. There are many light halters that can be worn under a bridle. These can come with ropes tied directly to the halter, without a snap, so they are comfortable while on the move. Or you may choose to carry the halter and/or rope in your saddlebag.

Even a well trained horse can get him self into trouble. Let's help them stay safe. ★
